CVCC's 50th Anniversary

Celebrations...

On Tuesday, September 19, 2023, Chattahoochee Valley Community College (CVCC) marked its 50th anniversary with a momentous event that brought together alumni, faculty, staff, and the local community. The occasion celebrated the institution's rich history, educational commitment, and profound impact on the Chattahoochee Valley region.

CVCC, founded in 1973, has been a cornerstone of educational opportunities in the region for half a century. Over the years, it has played a pivotal role in shaping the lives of thousands of students, providing them with affordable and accessible education.

The anniversary celebrations commenced with a ceremony at the College, attended by community members, alumni, and current students. As Chattahoochee Valley Community College looks ahead to its next chapter, it does so with a renewed commitment to providing quality education and continuing its legacy of service to the Chattahoochee Valley region. The 50th-anniversary celebration served as a fitting tribute to a half-century of excellence and an inspiration for the bright future ahead.

Nursing Graduates Pass Rates Exceed National Average

CVCC nursing graduates continue their trend of excellence with pass rates exceeding national and state averages on the 2022 National Council Licensure Examinations (NCLEX). The CVCC Stand-Alone Practical Nursing NCLEX-PN pass rate was 100%, the 1+1 Practical Nursing pass rate was 90.91% for an average pass rate of 95.45% for PN, and the Associate Degree Nursing RN pass rate was 94.12%. The national pass rates were 79.68% for PN and 74.13% for ADN. Alabama averages were 94.81% for PN and 88.66% for ADN.

The NCLEX exams are administered by the National Council of State Boards of Nursing (NCSBN), through which boards of nursing act and counsel to provide regulatory excellence for public health, safety, and welfare. The mandatory exam is taken after the student graduates from the program.



CVCC Celebrates Reaffirmation of Accreditation

On Tuesday, June 27, the College held a celebration to announce that the College has been reaffirmed by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Commission on Colleges (SACSCOC) for the next ten years. SACSCOC is the accrediting body for educational institutions at the two-year and four-year higher educational levels. The Commission on Colleges is the division of SACSCOC that oversees the accreditation of higher education, and institutions, regardless of location. The reaffirmation process is a vital part of any academic institution and an opportunity to review and evaluate work, note accomplishments and successes, reflect on improvement areas, and set future goals.

CVCC Honors Academic Excellence

In April, CVCC celebrated the academic achievements of 51 students during the annual Academic Awards Ceremony.

The ceremony recognizes students earning their Associate of Applied Science (AAS) degree who have excelled in their chosen program and are nominated by their instructors. Programs include Administrative Technology, Associate Degree Nursing, Business Management, Criminal Justice, Fire Science, Medical Assisting, and Visual Communications. The ceremony honors students who have earned a cumulative GPA of 3.75 or higher for their hard work, dedication, and commitment to academic excellence.

CVCC's All-Alabama Academic Team members, Alexis Becker and Nyah Rolle, were also recognized for their accomplishments. Students are nominated by their respective colleges, and those selected must possess a minimum GPA of 3.25, be involved in campus activities, and have completed 12 semester hours at the institution.



CVCC Celebrates Nursing Graduates with Traditional Pinning Ceremonies

On Thursday, December 14, CVCC hosted two pinning ceremonies to honor the graduates of the Practical Nursing and Associate Degree Nursing programs. These ceremonies, steeped in tradition and symbolism, marked a significant milestone in the journeys of aspiring nurses.

CVCC Hosts Veterans Resource Fair and Memorializes Soldiers for "Operation We Remember"



On Tuesday, September 12, CVCC held a Veterans Resource Fair, providing valuable support to student-veterans and their families. The event was organized by CVCC's Center of Excellence for Veteran Student Success (CEVSS).

CVCC recognizes the countless sacrifices veterans and their families have made and the unique challenges

veterans often face as they transition from military to civilian life. CEVSS was designed to help veterans and military-connected students bridge the gap and offer meaningful support. There are often resources and programs that veterans and their families may not be aware of as sources of support for post-military education and job opportunities, mental health care, and financial resources. These events also provide networking opportunities to connect with veteran-owned businesses and non-profit organizations. CEVSS Program Advisor Shanina Guyton organized the event and shared her passion for helping student veterans.

"Taking care of our returning veterans is crucial to their post-military success," Guyton said. "Our student-veterans often face

unique challenges that require support beyond what they need to pursue their educational endeavors. Our primary goal is to provide a space for them that fosters social, emotional, and mental wellbeing."

While the focus is frequently on honoring soldiers for their bravery on the battlefield, it is equally important to remember and commemorate those who have struggled with unseen battles within themselves. The Operation We Remember initiative takes place during the month of September, which also serves as National Suicide Prevention Awareness Month. The goal is to memorialize soldiers who have died by suicide while recognizing the importance of acknowledging the mental health challenges veterans face. The Operation We Remember campaign serves as a visual reminder by placing an American flag in each soldier's memory. There were 143 flags placed on the entrance lawn of the College's campus for the Alabama veterans who committed suicide in 2021. This marks the first year that community colleges have participated. The flags were generously donated by veteran-owned F&H Commercial Cleaners in Columbus, Georgia.

"I am humbled, honored, and excited to announce, in the coming athletic year, the Conference will again partner with Friends of Jaclyn, a nationwide non-profit organization whose mission aims to improve the quality of life for children with pediatric brain tumors and other childhood cancers," said Dean Myrick, Commissioner of ACCC. "Friends of Jaclyn (FOJ) does this by pairing children with local sports teams, clubs, and community groups, which provide a unique support system for the families as they navigate the cancer diagnosis."

Griffin Grimsley's journey has been one of bravery and resilience. Diagnosed with childhood cancer, his story touched the hearts of many, leading to a partnership that would change his life forever. CVCC, ACCC, and Friends of Jaclyn came together to provide Griffin with a support system to help him through his challenges and create a community of love and encouragement.

Griffin arrived at the campus, unaware of the warm reception that awaited him. As he, his mother, and siblings got out of their car, he was met with applause and cheers from CVCC athletes who donned their Pirate jerseys in honor of their newest teammate.

Friends of Jaclyn founder Denis Murphy shared how the organization came to be. His daughter, Jaclyn, was diagnosed with a malignant brain tumor in 2004 when she was just 9-years-old. Through a series of events, she was adopted by a collegiate lacrosse team as an honorary member. Her inspiration led the team to victory that season. Murphy emphasized the importance of community, resilience, and the power of sports to bring people together in times of adversity.

"Quality of life is not something we can afford to postpone," Murphy said. "Our mission is rooted in the belief that helping today, not tomorrow or next week, is the key to making a meaningful impact in the lives of children facing pediatric brain tumors and childhood cancers. Every moment counts, and our goal is to bring joy, love, and support to these brave young warriors today, enriching their lives and empowering them for a brighter future."

The ceremony's highlight came when Griffin was presented with numerous gifts and memorabilia to commemorate his induction into the Pirate family, including a signed baseball, t-shirt, hat, and his very own CVCC Pirate name badge.

"Our athletes' involvement in this event showcases the incredible compassion and teamwork that defines our sports community at CVCC," said Athletic Director Benjamin Hicks. "It's been a privilege to help organize this event, bringing together our dedicated student-athletes to support the Grimsley family. They are not just making a difference in this child's life but also discovering the profound impact that kindness and camaraderie can have on their own journey as athletes and individuals."

As the ceremony concluded, Griffin had not only gained a new group of friends but also a community that would rally behind him in his battle against cancer. The outpouring of love and support was palpable, and it was evident that Griffin had found a second family in CVCC.


